



## EXECUTION.

On Thursday last, pursuant to their sentence, Dominic Daley and James Halligan were executed at Northampton. At half past 10 o'clock they were conducted to the meeting-house by the High Sheriff, and his deputies, with a guard composed of a company of Artillery and a detachment of the militia. An appropriate and eloquent discourse was there delivered to a very crowded auditory, by the Rev. Mr. Cheverus of Boston, from 1. John, 3. 15. *Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer.* After the sermon the criminals were constantly attended by Mr. Cheverus, with whom, during the greater part of the time, they appeared to be engaged in prayer. At three o'clock sentence was executed by Major-General Mattoon, Sheriff of the county. Notwithstanding their protestations of innocence, in which they persisted to the last, it is believed that of the 15,000 persons supposed to have been present at the execution, scarcely one had a doubt of their guilt.—Daley and Halligan were natives of Ireland. Daley was about 34 years of age, and has been in this country two years; he has left a wife, a mother and brother in Boston. Halligan was about 27 years of age; and we believe had no connexions in this country, in which he has resided four years.
