the States of the Provinces of Zealand and Friesland have declared their difpostion to alk the mediation of fome neighbouring power (in case that your High Mightineffes judge such intervention ne-cessary) and that of Zealand has called to mind, on this occasion, the repeated affurances which the King has given of his friendship for the United Provinces: The underfigned, has express orders to affure your High Mightineffes that his Majefty has constantly strong at heart the re-establifthment of the tranquility of the republic, the prefervation of the true conftitution, and the maintenance of the just rights and privileges of all its members. His Majeffy feels the greatest fatisfaction in having reason to think that the internal means, furnished by the constitution itfelf, have power sufficient to accomplish fo falutary an object. But at the fame time, if your High Mightineffes are de-oided, that it is necessary to recur to a foreign mediation, and to invite his Majefty : then, in natural confequence of his affection, and of his good will for the Republic, the King will be eager to prove to your High Mightinesses, his fincere desire to employ all the care that may depend on his Majesty to bring a nego-ciation to a happy, solid, and permanent
