DEBATE ON THE JUDICIARY BILL—continued from our last.

MR. JACKSON: I rise, Sir, on what I conceive to be the most important subject; which has yet come before this House: It is that I have long considered, & with anxiety have decided, but on mature consideration, unimpaired with the same sentiments with the gentleman from New-Hampshire...

In fact the convenience of the people is, or ought to be the full privilege of every government; and the people have a right to expect it. Our present constitution has been formed with this view...
