CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. TUESDAY, April 27. MR. BOUDINOT of the committee appointed to bring in a bill providing for the mitigation of forfeitures accruing under the revenue laws, brought in a report which was read.

A report from the Post-Master General, pursuant to orders of the house, was read, relative to the establishment of Post-Offices on the cross roads, transportation of the Mails, &c. also a report from the same officer, on the memorial of Christopher Collins, respecting a survey of the roads of the United States.

Mr. GILMAN of the committee of enrollment, reported that the joint committee had examined the enrolled bill, entitled, an act to regulate the military establishment of the United States. The Speaker signed this act.

In committee of the whole on the report of the Secretary of the Treasury for the support of the public credit. Mr. FITZSIMONS observed that the house having determined the mode of funding the domestic debt of the United States—it remains to devise the ways and means.
