WAR DEPARTMENT.

MAY 30, 1791.

INFORMATION is hereby given to all the military invalids of the United States, that the sum to which they are entitled for six months of their annual pension from the 1st day of March, 1791, and which will become due on the 1st day of September ensuing, will be paid on the said day by the Commissioners of Loans within the States respectively, under the usual regulations, viz:

Every application for payment must be accompanied by the following vouchers.

1st. The certificate given by the State, specifying that the person possessing the same is in fact an invalid, and ascertaining the sum to which as such he is annually intitled.

2d. An affidavit, agreeable to the following form:

A. B. come before me, one of the Justices of the county of ————— in the State of ————— and make oath that he is the same A. B. to whom the original certificate in his possession was given, of which the following is a copy (the certificate given by the State is recited.) That he served ————— (regiment, corps, &c.) at the time he was disabled, and that he was reduced in ————— and county of ————— and has resided in ————— for the last ————— years, previous to which he resided in —————

In case an invalid should apply for payment by an attorney, the said attorney, besides the certificate and oath before recited, must produce a special letter of attorney agreeably to the following forms.

J. A. B. of ————— county of ————— state of ————— do hereby constitute and appoint C. D. of ————— my lawful attorney, to receive in my behalf of my pension for six months, as an invalid of the United States, from the fourth day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-one, and ending the tenth day of September of the same year.

Applications of executors and administrators must be accompanied with legal evidence of their respective offices, and also of the time the invalid died, whose pension they may claim.

LISBON, April 9.
An account of the Portuguese Embassy, to Morocco, and of the Present feast by the Envoy.

HER Majest having appointed James Philip de Lancaster, Brigadier of her armies, and Governor of Fero, to go in his name to congratulate the King of Morocco, Muley Beldiz, on his accession to the throne, that embassay embarked on board the frigate Cimarron, commanded by Captain P. I. da Silva Gama, which arrived from this harbor, the 28th of the same month, where he landed on the 31st. On his landing he was saluted by 21 guns, and found on the shore the Governor, Taber Fenice at the head of his garrison; as likewise all the foreign Confab residing there, by whom he was politely addressed. The Governor had prepared for him a beautiful horse, richly accoutred, which he made him a present of, and on which he rode to the Spanish Consulate-house, which was prepared for these congratulations, and concluding after his embassy's health, he said, that he was more pleased with this embassy, than with any other he might expect from the Chinese Princes, as it was sent by his great and respectable Queen, who had ten to compliment him before the other Princes of Europe, and that none of them should be entitled to obtain any favor from him but through her mediation; and that he would in every thing attend to her Envoy. And upon his returning with whom he was to have a conference, the King appointed his cousin and brother-in-law the Prince Muley Abdalmalik Bendir, for the purpose of escorting with the Envoy.

The conference being over, the King gave a signal to his troops fire, and after three discharges, he ordered the Portuguese musicians to be asked to play, which he heard attentively for the space of 20 minutes, after which he ordered 400 dragoons to be given them (a ducat 6/- pence Sterling.) After this the ambassador and his retinue were conducted by the King's officers, to a grove in the garden behind the palace, in one of the alleys was prepared a table with coffee and other refreshments, all served and attended by the high steward, richly dressed, and silver plates and fine porcelain of Saxon, the cups were served upon gold plates half an hour afterwards the Envoy received a message from the King, requesting that he would come to the park where he held his audience. There the cavalry was formed in two bodies, at the distance of 300 steps from one another, at the head of one body was the King with his eldest son, and several grandsons; at the head of the other was the Bahaw of Mequin, the King then sent word to the Envoy, that as a compliment in the Queen of Portugal, and as a token of the great regard he entertained for her, most faithful Majest, he would run races at full gallop, firing matches; when the King himself loaded his piece, the whole body, he commanded was run in motion, and after riding about 30 steps slowly, they gave a loud shout, and giving the spur to their horses, ran in full gallop to attack the other body, which was in front of them, at the distance of 20 or 25 steps, then made a general discharge, and in full gallop returned to their first position. After which the other body commanded by the Bahaw of Mequin, went through the same manœuvre. Three different times was this periled exertion by the King, when he retired to his audience.

In the course of his journey he was received by the Bahaws, and Governors, who offered him all sorts of refreshments, and entertained him with horse-races, the horsemen firing muskets; they galloped, according to the Moorish customs; and made presents of horses, of which he had received five on his arrival at Mequin, as likewise a lion's and two tiger's skins.

At Alquacqueriv, 120 horses were added to his retinue.

On the 23d of January the Envoy arrived at Mequin, where the King was, and had a league from the city he was met by 2000 horse, with standards headed by two of the King's daughters, one of his consorts, and a brother in law; the Pacha and Governor of the city, with several of the principal gentry; the Envoy was addressed by all; after the races he was conducted by his courtiers, and that he again received address.

The King moreover gave all the necessary orders to provide every thing for his maintenance and that of his retinue, and sent him a message that he should be allowed three days to recover from the fatigue of the journey, and that on the 26th, he should receive his first audience.

On the appointed day at nine o'clock in the morning, the King then observed, that he hoped the Envoy returned to his court satisfied, and that if his kingdom was not divided from Portugal by sea, he would in person go to compliment her Majest. Abdalmalik.

Then the monarch having exchanged with the Envoy the manœuvre, they went through the same manœuvre, and went through sheep manuvre exercise and firing, which pleased the King very much, who ordered the Envoy to be divided among them; after which he directed that the Envoy should be conducted to a wooden barrack, all surrounded with glass windows, which furnish a little distance from the palace, and when the King goes to see the Envoy, there he sent him several dishes from his table, which consisted of a boar's head, roasts, fowls, and sausages, which was for the Envoy's dinner, and of the other gentlemen with him; after that they brought them chocolate and coffee. After
