

CONGRESS

OF THE UNITED STATES.

PHILADELPHIA, Monday, October 24. THIS day the Second Congress of the United States assembled in this City, for the dispatch of public business.

The following Gentlemen of the Senate appeared in the Senate Chamber, viz. The Vice President of the United States, and President of the Senate.

A quorum of the House being present, they proceeded to the election of their officers.—The Hon. Jonathan Trumbull was chosen Speaker.—John Berkley, Esq. Clerk.—Joseph Wharton, Esq. Sergeant at Arms.—Mr. Gilford Dury, Door-keeper, and Mr. Thomas Claxton, Assistant Door-keeper.

Mr. Livermore administered the oath prescribed by the Constitution to the Speaker.—The Speaker then administered the same to the Members, and the Clerk respectively.

A message by Mr. Secretary Otis, informed, that the Senate, having made a House, were ready to proceed to business—and that they had appointed a committee to wait on the Presidents of the United States with this information. Committee—Messrs. Izard and Langdon.

A message from the House, by Mr. Berkley, informed the Senate that a quorum of the Members was assembled, and ready to proceed to business—and that they had appointed a committee on their part, to join the above committee of the Senate.

The joint committee waited on the President of the United States accordingly, who was pleased to inform them that he would meet the two Houses in the Senate Chamber, to-morrow, at 12 o'clock.

A message from the Senate informed the House that they had appointed the Rev. Bishop White, Chaplain to Congress, on their part.

The House postponed their choice of a Chaplain till to-morrow.—Adjourned till 11 o'clock to-morrow.

Monday, October 25. Mr. Clark, Mr. Dayton, and Mr. Kitchell, from New Jersey, and Mr. Jacobs, member for Pennsylvania, took their seats this day—and were qualified according to the Constitution.

On motion of Mr. Livermore, the House proceeded to elect a Chaplain; the ballots being collected and counted, it appeared that the Rev. Dr. Blair was chosen.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Secretary Otis, informing the House that the Senate is now ready to meet the members in the Senate chamber, to receive the President of the United States, and such communications as he may be pleased to make; and that seats are provided accordingly.

The Speaker (preceeded by the Sergeant at arms, with his Mace) attended by the Members, proceeded to the Senate Chamber.—At 12 o'clock the President of the United States arrived, attended by Mr. Secretary Lear, and Major Jackson, and accompanied by the Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of War, and the Attorney-General, when he was pleased to make the following Speech:—

SPEECH OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, to Both Houses of Congress.

FELLOW CITIZENS OF THE SENATE and of the HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

I MEET you, upon the present occasion, with feelings which are naturally inspired by a strong impression of the prosperous situation of our common country, and by a persuasion equally strong, that the labors of the session, which has just commenced, will, under the guidance of a spirit no less prudent than patriotic, lead in measures conducive to the stability and increase of national prosperity.

Numerous as are the providential blessings which demand our grateful acknowledgements—the abundance with which another year has again rewarded the industry of the husbandman is too important to escape recollection.

Your own observations, in your respective situations, will have satisfied you of the progressive state of agriculture, manufactures, commerce and navigation: in tracing their causes, you will have marked, with particular pleasure, the happy effects of that revival of confidence, public as well as private, on that revival of confidence, and laws of the United States have so eminently contributed; and you will have observed, with no less interest, new and decisive proofs of the increasing reputation and credit of the nation. But you never-theless cannot fail to derive satisfaction from the confirmation of these circumstances, which will be disclosed, in the several official communications, that will be made to you in the course of your deliberations.

The rapid subscriptions to the Bank of the United States which completed the sum allowed to be subscribed, in a single day, is among the striking and pleasing evidences which present themselves, not only of confidence in the government, but of resource in the community.

In the interval of your recess, due attention has been paid to the execution of those laws and resolutions which were especially provided for, and which have been the subject of the late session.

Among the most important of these, is the defence and security of the Western Frontiers. To accomplish it on the most humane principles, was a primary wish.

Accordingly at the same time, that treaties have been provisionally concluded, and other proper means used to attach the warring, and to confirm in their friendship the well disposed tribes of Indians—official measures have been adopted to make those of a hostile description sensible, that a pacification was desired upon terms of moderation and justice.

These measures having proved unsuccessful, it became necessary to convince the refractory power of the United States to punish their depredations. Offensive operations have therefore been directed, to be conducted as consistently as possible with the dictates of humanity. Some of these have been crowned with full success, and others are yet depending. The expeditions which have been completed, were carried on under the authority, and at the expense of the United States, by the Militia of Kentucky; whose enterprise, integrity and good conduct, are entitled to peculiar commendation.

Overtures of peace are still continued to the deluded tribes, and considerable numbers of individuals belonging to them have lately renounced all further opposition, removed from their former stations, and placed themselves under the immediate protection of the United States.

It is generally to be desired, that all need of coercion, in future, may cease; and that an intimate intercourse may succeed calculated to advance the happiness of the Indians, and to attach them firmly to the United States.

In order to this, it seems necessary, that they should experience the benefits of an impartial dispensation of justice.

That the mode of alienating their lands, the main source of discontent and war, should be so defined and regulated, as to obviate imposition, and, as far as may be practicable, controversy concerning the reality, and extent of the alienations which are made.

That commerce with them should be promoted, under regulations so defined, as to secure an equitable department towards them, and that such rational exertions should be made, for imparting to them the blessings of civilization, as may, from time to time, favor their condition.

That the Executive of the United States should be entitled to employ the means to which the Indians have been long accustomed for uniting their immediate interests with the preservation of peace.

And, that efficacious provision should be made for insuring adequate penalties upon all those who, by violating their rights, shall infringe the treaties, and endanger the peace of the Union.

A system conforming with the mild principles of religion and philanthropy towards an unenlightened race of men, whose happiness materially depends on the conduct of the United States, would be as honorable to the national character as conformable to the dictates of sound policy.

The powers specially vested in me by the act laying certain duties on distilled spirits, which respect the subdivisions of the districts into surveys, the appointment of officers, and the assignment of compensations, have likewise been carried into effect.—In a matter in which both materials and experience were wanted to guide the calculation, it will be readily conceived that there must have been difficulty in making an adjustment of the rates of compensation with a proper regard to the limits prescribed by the law. It is hoped that the circumplexity which has been used will be found in the result to have secured the labors of the two objects; but it is probable, that with a view to the first, in some instances a revision of the provision will be found advisable.

The impressions with which this law has been received by the community have been, upon the whole, such as were to be expected among enlightened and well disposed citizens, from the propriety and necessity of the measure.—The novelty however of the tax in particular places to some degree of discontent.—But it is satisfactory to know that this disposition yields to proper explanations, and more just apprehensions of the nature of the law. And I entertain a full confidence, that it will, in all, give way to motives, which arise out of a just sense of duty, and a virtuous regard to the public welfare.

If there are any circumstances in the law, which, consistently with its main design, may be so varied as to remove any well intentioned objections, that may happen to exist, it will consist with a wise moderation to make the proper variations. It is desirable, on all occasions, to unite with a regard to the public interest, constitutional and necessary, with the most liberal and salutary evidence of a disposition, as far as may be practicable, to conform the wishes of every part of the community; and to lay the foundations of the public administration in the affections of the people.

Pursuant to the authority contained in the several acts on that subject—a district of nine miles square for the permanent seat of the government of the United States has been fixed, and announced by Proclamation; which district will comprehend lands on both sides of the River Potomac, and the towns of Alexandria and George Town.—A city has also been laid out, preparatory to a plan which will be placed before Congress. And as there is a prospect favored by the rate of sales which have already taken place, of ample funds for carrying on the necessary public buildings, there is every reason to believe that the project will be successful.

The completion of the Census of the inhabitants for which provision was made by law, has been duly notified (excepting one instance in which the returns have been informal, and another in which it has been omitted, or miscarried) the returns of the officers who were charged with this duty, which will be laid before you, will give you the pleasing assurance that the present population of the United States borders on four millions of persons.

It is proper also to inform you that a further loan of two millions and a half of Florins, has been completed in Holland; the terms of which are similar to those of the one last announced, except as to a small reduction of charges. Another on like terms for six millions of Florins has been set on foot under circumstances that afford immediate completion.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE. Two Treaties which have been provisionally concluded with the Cherokee, and six nations of Indians, will be laid before you for your consideration, and ratification.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives. In entering upon the discharge of your legislative trust, you must anticipate with pleasure, that many of the difficulties, peculiarly incident to the arrangements of a new government, for an extensive country, have been happily surmounted by the zeal and industry of your predecessors in co-operation with the other branch of the Legislature. The important objects, which remain to be accomplished, will, I am persuaded, be conducted upon principles equally comprehensive, and equally well calculated for the advancement of the general welfare.

The time limited for receiving subscriptions to the loans proposed by the act making provision for the debt of the United States having expired, statements from the proper departments will, as soon as possible, specify you of the exact result. Enough however is already known to afford an assurance that the views, have been happily surmounted by the zeal and industry of your predecessors in co-operation with the other branch of the Legislature. The important objects, which remain to be accomplished, will, I am persuaded, be conducted upon principles equally comprehensive, and equally well calculated for the advancement of the general welfare.

G. WASHINGTON. UNITED STATES, October 25, 1791. The President then retired, and the Members returned to their Hall, where the Speaker laid before them a copy of the Speech which was read by the Clerk. On motion of Mr. Lawrence, it was voted that the Speech of the President of the United States be referred to a committee of the whole House, and be made the order of the day for 11 o'clock.—The house then adjourned to this day 11 o'clock.

TRISTE, (Germany) July 18. The Emperor's French frigate, which had been in this harbor, this four weeks past, offered to compliment the Emperor in a body on his passage through this city. The Emperor not only refused to receive them, but departed one day sooner than he had promised, because he was informed that the crew intended to celebrate the 14th anniversary of the French Revolution.

This monarch had even ordered the frigate, which had hoisted the national flag to leave this port; but on representation of Count Estrada, that he was not able to enforce his orders, the Count having but a few bad cannons, the Emperor condescended not to insist on the execution of his orders.

SEPTEMBER 8. His Majesty the Emperor of Morocco is going to renew hostilities against Spain. Already 12,000 men were engaged before Ceuta, against which the siege is immediately to be opened.

Extract of a letter from the Hague, Sept. 2. An express is arrived here with accounts that peace has been signed between Russia and the Porte at Maccin, in sight of the two armies.

There is not the least doubt of the powers of Europe forming a league to settle the affairs of France, but it is said, that the courts of England, Prussia, and Holland, have not yet absolutely come into the views of other powers in that important affair.

The following is an Extract of a letter from a Gentleman at Birmingham. My half-brother began this morning to talk about Dr. Priestley, he said, "he was sure he was a very bad man."—I asked him "for what account?"—because, "said he, he is in Parliament, and wanted to bring in a bill to destroy the Church, by bringing in Roman Catholic Kings, and the like."—He added, "The Doctor himself is a Papist."

When such assertions are made, we look further than to the authors of them, for the true cause of the late disorders at Birmingham.

The French ambassador at the court of Vienna, is not only considered there as a private individual. The Emperor has refused to acknowledge him as a public character, and accordingly he does not go to court.

We learn daily that the German troops of Luxembourg, and of the whole Imperial Gorden, upon the borders, desert continually and pass over into France, with their arms and baggage, which they sell immediately on their arrival, to good account.

An African slave ship was lately lost on the middle passage—the account adds, that the men were saved, but the ship and cargo lost.—Lest the reader should mistake the nature of this cargo, he is informed that it consisted of 250 of our fellow creatures—found guilty of being born in Guinea, and of black parents.

An Irish officer, detained upwards of twelve years in the Island of St. Marguerite, in consequence of a letter he wrote, has found means to write a letter to the President of the National Assembly, in which he has informed him of his situation, and demanded the justice and the vengeance of a free nation.

BOSTON, Nov. 2. From HISPANIOLA—viz SALEM. Mr. Harrington, arrived at Salem, from Cape Francois, informs that on the 20th of September, a body of 500 troops from that de Camp, among which Mr. H. himself, and another of 420 from Petit Anse, attacked a fortified camp of the Negroes on Gallifault's estate, which was defended with 9 cannon.

The assaults had 24 pounders, and 6000 pieces. The attack began at 9 o'clock in the morning, and after a desperate resistance, the Negroes and they gained complete possession of it. The Negroes, who were chiefly mounted, fired entered a horned cart, which they used for a magazine, and they were annihilated at 2 o'clock when the troops laid down their arms, and went to plundering a troop which they burnt every thing which was left, as they could not spare time to defend the place; retook five white women, whom the Negroes had taken among many others on the plantations, and kept for wives. Previous to the attack, there were supposed to have been in the place 600 Negroes; but it was found that they had been secretly retreating and carrying off our countrymen to two days before, to Red Bank, and there were only 100 Negroes left at the time of the attack. The whites had only two men killed, and a number wounded in this engagement. No material actions took place after this, until Mr. Harrington's departure; there was every day continual skirmishing. After this engagement, the main body of the Negroes in that quarter of the country, established themselves at Red Bank, a
