WESTERN DISCOVERIES.

Tuesday, Feb. 28. The House proceeded to the consideration of the report of the joint Committee on the subject of building a Bridge over Charles River, from West Boston to Cambridge; and after a free and full discussion, the question on the expediency of the measure, was determined in the affirmative.
