

An Act providing for the due observance of the Lord's Day, and repealing the several Laws heretofore made for that purpose.

WHEREAS the observance of the Lord's day is highly promotive of the welfare of a community, by affording necessary seasons for relaxation from labour and the cares of business; for moral reflections & conversation on the duties of life, and the frequent errors of human conduct; for public and private worship of the Maker, Governor and Judge of the World, and for those acts of charity which support and adorn a Christian Society: And whereas some thoughtless and irreligious persons, inattentive to the duties and benefits of the Lord's day, profane the same, by unnecessarily pursuing their worldly business and recreations on that day, to their own great damage, as members of a Christian Society, to the great disturbance of well disposed persons, and to the great damage of the community, by producing dissipation of manners and immoralities of life:

Be it therefore enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, That no person or persons whatsoever, shall keep open his, her or their shop, ware-house, or work-house, nor shall upon land or water, do any manner of labour, business or work, (works of necessity and charity only excepted) nor be present at any concert of music, dancing or any public diversion, game or entertainment, nor use any sport, show, play, or recreation on the Lord's day, or any part thereof, upon penalty of a sum, not exceeding twenty shillings, nor less than ten shillings for every offence.

Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That no traveller, drover, wagoner, teamster, or any of their servants, shall travel on the Lord's day, or any part thereof (except from necessity or charity) upon the penalty of a sum, not exceeding twenty shillings, nor less than ten shillings.

Be it further enacted, That no vintner, retailer of strong liquors, innholder, or other person keeping a house of public entertainment, shall entertain or suffer any of the inhabitants of the respective towns where they dwell, or lodgers, in such houses, to abide and remain in their houses, yards, orchards, or fields, drinking or spending their time, either idly or at play, or doing any secular business on the Lord's day, or any part thereof, on penalty of ten shillings, payable by such vintner, retailer or innholder, or person keeping such house of entertainment, for each person so entertained or suffered; and every person so drinking or abiding (except as aforesaid) shall pay a fine not exceeding ten shillings, nor less than five shillings; and every such licensed person upon any conviction after the first, shall pay a fine of twenty shillings, and having been three times convicted, shall be debarr'd from renewing his licence forever after.

And although it is the sense of this Court, that the time commanded in the sacred scriptures, to be observed as holy time, includes a natural day, or twenty-four hours; yet whereas there is a difference of opinion concerning the beginning & ending of the Lord's day, among the good people of this Commonwealth, and this Court being unwilling to lay any restrictions which may seem unnecessary or unreasonable to persons of sobriety and conscience:

Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all the foregoing regulations, respecting the due observance of the Lord's day, shall be construed to extend to the time included between the midnight preceding and the sun setting of the same day.

Be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, That no person shall be present at any concert of music, dancing, or other public diversion, nor shall any person or persons use any game, sport, play or recreation, on land or water, on the evening next preceding or succeeding the Lord's day, on pain of ten shillings, for each offence; and no retailer, innholder or person licensed to keep a public

house, shall entertain, or suffer to remain, or be in their houses or yards, or other places appurtenant, any person or persons (travellers, strangers or lodgers excepted) drinking or spending their time on the said evenings, on penalty of ten shillings, for each offence.

And whereas the public worship of Almighty God, is esteemed by christians an essential part of the due observance of the Lord's day, and requires the greatest decency and reverence for a due performance of the same:

Be it therefore enacted, That any person being able of body and not otherwise necessarily prevented, who shall for the space of three months together, absent him or herself, from the public worship of God, on the Lord's day, (provided there be any place of worship, at which he or she can conscientiously and conveniently attend) shall pay a fine of ten shillings.

Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if any person shall on the Lord's day, within the walls of any house of public worship, behave rudely or indecently, he or she shall pay a fine not more than forty shillings, nor less than five shillings.

And be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if any person or persons, either on the Lord's day, or at any other time, shall willfully interrupt or disturb any assembly of people met for the public worship of God, within the place of their assembling, or out of it, he or they shall severally pay a fine not exceeding ten pounds nor less than twenty shillings.

Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That no person shall give or execute any civil process, from midnight preceding to midnight following the Lord's day; but the service thereof shall be void, and the person serving the same, shall be liable to answer damages to the party aggrieved, as if he had done the same, without any such civil process.

And be it further enacted, That the Tythingmen chosen, or which shall be chosen in the several towns and districts within this Commonwealth, shall be held and obliged to enquire into, & inform of all offences against this act, and all such Tythingmen as shall be hereafter chosen, shall take the following oath.

YOU being chosen a Tythingman, for the town of _____, for the year ensuing, and until another shall be chosen in your room, do solemnly swear, that you will diligently attend to, and faithfully execute the duties of the said office, without partiality, and according to your best discretion and judgment. So help you GOD.

And every such Tythingman, is hereby authorized and empowered, to enter into any of the rooms and other parts of an inn, or public house of entertainment, on the Lord's day; and if such entrance shall be refused to any Tythingman, the landlord or licensed person, shall forfeit the sum of forty shillings, for each and every offence. And the said Tythingmen are hereby further authorized & empowered, within their respective towns, to examine all persons whom they shall have good cause, from the circumstances thereof, to suspect of unnecessarily travelling as aforesaid, on the Lord's day, and to demand of all such persons the cause thereof, together with their names and places of abode; and if any person shall refuse to give answer, or shall give a false answer to such demand, he shall pay a fine not exceeding five pounds, nor less than twenty shillings; and if the reason given for such travelling, shall not be satisfactory to such Tythingman, he shall enter a complaint against the person travelling, before a justice of the Peace in the county where the offence is committed, if such person lives in such county, otherwise shall give information thereof, to some Grand Jurymen to be by him laid before the Grand Jury, for their consideration and punishment.

And be it further enacted, That the oath of any Tythingman shall be deemed full and sufficient evidence, in any trial for any offence against this act, unless in the judgment of the Court of justice, the same shall be invalidated

by other evidence that may be produced. And be it further enacted, That the special authority given by this act to Tythingmen for preventing the breaches thereof, shall not be construed or understood to exempt any Sheriff, Grand Jurors, Constables or other officers or persons whatsoever, from any obligations or duty, to cause this act to be put in execution, but they shall be held to take due notice and prosecute all breaches thereof, of such special authority notwithstanding.

And be it further enacted, That all the penalties and fines, incurred and paid for any of the offences aforesaid, shall be for the use of the Commonwealth: And that all said offences, the penalties against which exceed forty shillings, shall be prosecuted by presentment of the Grand Jury, before the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, in the county where the offence may be committed: But all of offences, the penalty whereof does not exceed forty shillings, (except the offender lives out of the county in which the offence may be committed) shall be prosecuted by complaint before a Justice of the Peace in such county. —But when the offender lives out of the county, he may be prosecuted by presentment aforesaid, although the penalty does not exceed forty shillings.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES. AN ACT

for establishing a Mint, and regulating the Coins of the United States.
Section 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, and a solemnly enacted and declared, That a mint for the purpose of a national coinage, be, and the same is established; to be situate and carried on at the seat of government of the United States, for the time being: And that for the well conducting of the business of the said mint, there shall be the following officers and powers, namely:—a director, an assayer, a chief coiner, a treasurer, &c.

Section 2. And be it further enacted, That the director of the mint shall employ as many clerks, workmen and servants as he shall from time to time find necessary, subject to the approbation of the President of the United States.
Section 3. And be it further enacted, That the respective functions and duties of the officers aforesaid, shall be as follow:—The director of the mint shall have the chief management of the business thereof, and shall superintend all other officers and persons who shall be employed in the mint, and shall receive and give receipts for all metals which may lawfully be brought to the mint to be coined; shall assay all such metals as may be required, and shall deliver them to the chief coiner to be coined. The chief coiner shall coin all the said metals in such quantities as shall be required by the mint, and shall be responsible for the loss of any metal which he shall coin, and shall prepare the necessary dies for such coinage, with the proper devices and inscriptions, but it shall be lawful for the functions and duties of the chief coiner and engraver to be performed by one person. The treasurer shall have been struck, and shall pay all the moneys which shall be paid or delivered to whom the same may be due, and shall receive and safely keep all moneys which shall be for the use, maintenance and support of the mint, and shall likewise the same upon warrants signed by the director.

Section 4. And be it further enacted, That every officer and clerk of the said mint, shall, before he enters upon the execution of his office, take an oath or affirmation before some judge of the United States, faithfully and diligently to perform the duties thereof.
Section 5. And be it further enacted, That the said assayer, chief coiner, and treasurer, respectively, shall be sworn to the execution of their respective offices, shall be sworn to the United States of America, with one or more oaths, to the satisfaction of the secretary of the Treasury, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, with condition for the faithful and diligent performance of the duties of his office.

Section 6. And be it further enacted, That there shall be allowed and paid as compensation for their respective services:—to the said director, a yearly salary of two thousand dollars; to the said assayer, a yearly salary of one thousand five hundred dollars; to the said chief coiner, a yearly salary of one thousand five hundred dollars; to the said treasurer, a yearly salary of one thousand two hundred dollars; to each clerk who may be employed, a yearly salary not exceeding five hundred dollars; and to the several subordinate workmen and servants, such wages and allowances as are customary and reasonable, according to their respective stations and occupations.

Section 7. And be it further enacted, That the accounts of the officers and persons employed in and about the said mint, and for services performed in relation thereto, and all other accounts concerning the business and administration thereof, shall be adjusted and settled in the treasury department of the United States; and a quarterly account of the receipts and disbursements of the said mint shall be rendered at the said treasury for settlements, according to such forms and regulations as shall have been prescribed by that department; and that once in each year, a report of the transactions of the said mint, accompanied by an abstract of the settlements which shall have been from time to time made, duly certified by the Comptroller of the Treasury, shall be laid before Congress for their information.

Section 8. And be it further enacted, That in addition to the authority vested in the President of the United States by a resolution of the last session, touching the engraving of medals, and the procuring of apparatus for the said mint, the President be authorized, and he is hereby authorized to cause to be provided and put in proper condition, book buildings, and in such manner as shall appear to him requisite for the purpose of carrying on the business of the said mint; and that as well the expenses which shall have been incurred pursuant to the said resolution, as those which may be incurred in providing and carrying on the said buildings, and all other expenses which shall hereafter accrue for the maintenance and support of the said mint, and for carrying on the business thereof, over and above the sums which may be received by reason of the sale of the mint, for coinage thereon after mentioned, shall be defrayed from the

Treasury of the United States, out of any moneys which may from time to time shall be therein, not otherwise appropriated.

Section 9. And be it further enacted, That there shall be from time to time struck and coined at the said mint coins of gold, silver, and copper, of the following denominations, values and descriptions, viz. EAGLES—each to be the value of ten dollars or ten cents, and to contain two hundred and forty-seven grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or two hundred and seventy grains of standard gold. HALF EAGLES—each to be of the value of five dollars, and to contain one hundred and twenty-three grains and six eighths of a grain of pure, or one hundred and twenty-five grains of standard gold. DOLLARS—each to be of the value of two dollars and a half dollar, and to contain one hundred and thirty-four grains and two eighths of a grain of pure, or one hundred and thirty-six grains and four eighths of a grain of standard gold. QUARTER DOLLARS—each to be of the value of one dollar and one half dollar, and to contain sixty-seven grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or sixty-eight grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard gold. DIME—each to be of the value of one fourth part of a dollar, and to contain thirty-three grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or thirty-four grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard gold. HALF DIME—each to be of the value of one eighth part of a dollar, and to contain sixteen grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or sixteen grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard gold. PENNY—each to be of the value of one sixteenth part of a dollar, and to contain eight grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or eight grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. HALF PENNY—each to be of the value of one thirty-second part of a dollar, and to contain four grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or four grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. THREE FARINGS—each to be of the value of one sixtieth part of a dollar, and to contain two grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or two grains and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. TWO FARINGS—each to be of the value of one thirtieth part of a dollar, and to contain one grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. FARING—each to be of the value of one sixtieth part of a dollar, and to contain one half grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one half grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. HALF FARING—each to be of the value of one twelfth part of a dollar, and to contain one quarter grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one quarter grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. QUARTER FARING—each to be of the value of one twenty-fourth part of a dollar, and to contain one eighth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one eighth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. EIGHTH FARING—each to be of the value of one forty-eighth part of a dollar, and to contain one sixteenth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one sixteenth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SIXTEENTH FARING—each to be of the value of one ninety-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one thirty-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one thirty-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. THIRTY-SECOND FARING—each to be of the value of one one hundred and ninety-second part of a dollar, and to contain one sixty-fourth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one sixty-fourth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SIXTY-FOURTH FARING—each to be of the value of one three hundred and eighty-fourth part of a dollar, and to contain one one hundred and twenty-eighth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one hundred and twenty-eighth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-SIXTH FARING—each to be of the value of one seven hundred and sixty-eighth part of a dollar, and to contain one two hundred and fifty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one two hundred and fifty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. THREE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-TWO FARING—each to be of the value of one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one five hundred and one hundred and eighty-fourth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one five hundred and one hundred and eighty-fourth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SEVEN HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-TWO FARING—each to be of the value of one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. ONE THOUSAND AND FORTY EIGHT FARING—each to be of the value of one six thousand three hundred and sixty-fourth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. TWO THOUSAND AND NINETY SIX FARING—each to be of the value of one twelve thousand seven hundred and twenty-eighth part of a dollar, and to contain one six thousand three hundred and sixty-fourth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one six thousand three hundred and sixty-fourth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. FOUR THOUSAND AND NINETEEN TWO FARING—each to be of the value of one twenty-five thousand four hundred and forty-eighth part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. EIGHT THOUSAND AND THIRTY EIGHT FARING—each to be of the value of one fifty thousand eight hundred and ninety-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SIXTEEN THOUSAND AND SEVENTY SEVEN FARING—each to be of the value of one one hundred and one thousand seven hundred and ninety-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. THIRTY TWO THOUSAND AND FIFTEEN FIVE FARING—each to be of the value of one two thousand three hundred and thirty-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SIXTY FOUR THOUSAND AND THIRTY ONE FARING—each to be of the value of one four thousand six hundred and seventy-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY EIGHT THOUSAND AND SIXTY THREE FARING—each to be of the value of one nine thousand three hundred and thirty-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY SIX THOUSAND AND TWENTY SEVEN FARING—each to be of the value of one eighteen thousand six hundred and seventy-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. THIRTY TWO THOUSAND AND FIFTY FIVE THOUSAND AND FIFTY FIVE FARING—each to be of the value of one thirty-six thousand three hundred and thirty-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. SIXTY FOUR THOUSAND AND THIRTY ONE THOUSAND AND FIFTY FIVE FARING—each to be of the value of one seventy-two thousand six hundred and seventy-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY EIGHT THOUSAND AND SIXTY THREE THOUSAND AND FIFTY FIVE FARING—each to be of the value of one one hundred and one thousand three hundred and thirty-sixth part of a dollar, and to contain one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one three thousand one hundred and seventy-second grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver. TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY SIX THOUSAND AND TWENTY SEVEN THOUSAND AND FIFTY FIVE FARING—each to be of the value of one two hundred and one thousand seven hundred and ninety-second part of a dollar, and to contain one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and four eighths of a grain of pure, or one one thousand five hundred and thirty-sixth grain and eight eighths of a grain of standard silver.
