An engrossed bill, entitled "An act in addition to an act to provide for the territory northwest of the river Ohio," was read the third time, and the blanks were filled up, and the bill passed.

WHAT Aristotle said of the mechanical powers, which may be applied to reason and liberty:—
"Had we," said he, "a place to stand upon, we might raise the world."

The revolution of America, proffered in politics what was only theory in mechanics. So deeply rooted were all the governments of the old world, and so effectively had the tyranny and the antiquity of habit established itself over the mind, that no beginning could be made in Asia, Africa or Europe, to reform the political condition of man. Freedom had been hunted round the globe: reason was considered as rebellion; and the slavery of fear had made men afraid to think.

Such is the irreducible nature of truth, that all it asks, and all it wants, is the liberty of appearing. The sun needs no inscription to distinguish him from darkness; and no foster did the American governments display themselves to the world, than depots felt a shock, and MAN began to contemplate redress.

The independence of America, considered merely as a revolution from England, would have been a matter of but little importance, had it not been accompanied by a revolution in the principles and practice of government. She made a stand, not for herself only, but for the world; and looked beyond the advantage herself could receive. Even the Hessian, though hired to fight against her, may live to bless his defeat; and England, condemning the viciousness of its government, rejoice in its misfortune.

S T O C K H O L M, March 24.
DEATH of the KING of SWEDEN.
HIS SWEDISH MAJESTY expired yesterday morning. The prince Royal was immediately proclaimed King, by the name of Gustavus Adolphus, the Duke of Sudermania, in compliance with His Majesty's will was declared *Regei, et Consul* of the young Sovereign, until he attains his majority, which is fixed at the age of eighteen.

The assassin, who appears to be the difflimed Captain Akerstrom, was detected, and arrested the next day about ten in the forenoon. He immediately confessed the fact, and said, that the pistol he fired was loaded with two balls, 12 small shot, and several grains of nail; that the second pistol was charged in nearly the same manner; and, moreover, he had a very good knife, with a hook to it. He has been very obstinate, but has hitherto refused to discover his accomplices.

Yesterday, Count Claude de Horn, and Count de King, were arrested. The confinement in this city is so general, that almost every one trembles for his own family as well as for the public welfare. The prisons are full, and it is not sufficiently understood; but it appears, that their effect was to exasperate the minds of the discontented, who immediately after the death of the King, began to plan attempts against his person.

BALTIMORE, June 1.
By the Brigantine Greyhound, Capt. Elias Porter, who arrived here in thirteen days from Cape Francis, we are informed, that the situation of affairs, respecting the disturbances in Hispaniola, were every day a more melancholy aspect—that all hopes of peace being restored, were relinquished—that the colony was, beyond a doubt, irrevocably lost—that lately, some expectations were entertained of the arrival of a troop from France, but then every prospect of that nature had closed in despair—that attacks were made, almost every night, on the outposts contiguous to the Cape—that the military force was so weakened, that a general massacre was apprehended—that the Whites were emigrating daily, and it was thought that, in the course of a few months, not one would be found remaining on the French part of the Island—that it was generally believed, that some celebrated characters (among whom it is supposed to be the well known Count DE MONTMAYN, who had a life before arrived to a distinguished manner, from France) were the chief actors among the revolted Malabars—that the chief attempt was in a state of the most ruinous emergency, the members having, on the day before Captain Porter sailed, carried their differences on political opinions so far, that they actually drew their swords on each other, and the boats would have been trampled in blood, had not the interposition of some less turbulent spirits subdued the desperate ferment.

LONDON, March 25.
Mr. LATTON, of the Bury, lately returning hundred friends to a new tub.
