PROCEEDINGS OF THE GENERAL COURT. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. THURSDAY, June 14.

THE Committee on the expediency of continuing the law rendering proceedings in law less expensive, reported that the same should be continued for three years.

FRIDAY, June 15. A bill to incorporate (sundry persons by the name of the President and Directors of the Union Bank,

SATURDAY, June 16. Ordered, that Mr. Slocum, Mr. Jarvis and Mr. Brock be a Committee to inquire whether any person who holds any office under the United States, is a Member of this House.

MONDAY, June 18. A Committee were appointed to ascertain the salary of the Lt. Governour, the present year, and the payment of the civil list.

THE Committee were appointed to consider the expediency of a bill for building a bridge over Meeting-House River in the County of Essex, was read, and passed to be enacted.

discrepancy of discontinuing the Committee for methodizing public accounts, requested a resolve for the purpose which was accordingly agreed to.

TUESDAY, June 19. A message from the Senate, proposing that the two Houses should meet in Convention to-morrow, for the purpose of choosing a Senator for the county of Plymouth,

WEDNESDAY, June 20. A bill in addition to the several Acts now in force, which respect the carrying of powder through the streets of Boston, and the storage thereof in said town, was read a third time, and passed to be enacted.

The two Houses then separated. The House proceeded according to an agreement to the choice of Major-General for the second division of the Militia of the Commonwealth, and the vote being taken by ballot, it appeared that

A Bill providing for a more equitable mode of paying Jurors, was read a third time, and passed to-morrow, (this day) 10 o'clock, till fixed for the third reading.

A resolve for continuing the bounty on Hemp, for one year from the first of July, 1792, was read and accepted.

The bill incorporating D. A. Tyng, Esq. and others for the purpose of rendering Merrimack River navigable with Irons &c. by the name of the proprietors of Locks and Canals, was read a third time, and passed to be enacted, with amendments.

On the 19th inst. a meeting of the House of Representatives, at Philadelphia, May twenty-third, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, and continued by adjournment until the twenty-ninth of the same month.
