For it is off-evident, that if there are any men whom they have a right to hold in savery, there may be others who have had a right to hold them in savery. But nothing can exceude the united States if it is Jetten forme measure to be the effect of time and man-men. I replice that on this occa-tion I can recommend to them the example of my own country.——I Beitzing a negro becomes a freeman the moment he fets his foot on British ground.

CONCLUSION.

OUCH is the advice which I would hambly (but a carnelly) offer to the United States of discrict.—
Such are the means by which they may become the feat pf liberty, ficience, peace, and virue; happy within themfelves, and a refuge to the world.

Often, while employed in writing these papers, have I wished for a warning voice of more power. The pre-sent moment, however anspicious to the United States ient noment, nowever adjustions to the United States if wilely emproved, is critical; and, though apparen-ly the end of their greatest dauger. I have, indeed, in shinhing this Address, been mortified more than I can express by accounts which haveled me to fear that I have extrict my ideas of them too high, and deceived mostly this higheavy expectations. And Scate have carried my ideas of them too high, and deceived my left with visionary expeditions.— And finould this be true-flouid the return of peace and the pride of lodependence lead them to fecurity and diffigution—fhould they loofethoft virtuous and dispule manners by which alone Republics can long fubfiff—thould faller refinement, luxny, and impley, forcad among them; excellive jeanoly diffical their governments; and clafficing interests, fubject to no firong control, break the federal union—The confragence will be, that the fair-ted experiment ever tried in human affairs will mifezer by; and that a resolution which had nevived the hopes of good queen and promifed arropening to better times. of good men and promifed an opening to better times, will become a discouragement to all future efforts in favor of liberty, and prove only an opening to a new feene of human degeneracy and mifery.
