Extra@ from Dr. HENRY's HISTORY. "SLAVES fill continue to be a capital article, both in the internal and foreign trade of Britain. When an effate was conveyed from one to another, all the villains of flaves annexed to that effate were conveyed at the fame time, and by the fame deed. When any perion had more children than be could maintain, o ore domeffic flaves than he chofe to keep he fold then more dometric laws than he clot to sceep, he to to to a merchant, who disposed of them either at home or abroad, as he found would be most profitable." It was a common vice, (Lays Giraldus Cambrens) of the English when they were reduced to poverty, that rather than endure it patiently, they exposed their own children to fale. Many of these unhappy persons wer cerried into Ireland, and no doubt into other countries and there fold. A firong law was made against this barbarous kind of commerce, in a great council held at St. Peter's, Westminster, A.D. 1102. "Let no man at St. Peter 3, wettingner, A.D. 1102. "Let no man for the foture, prefume to early on the wicked trade of felling men in markets, like brute beals, which hi-therto has been the common cuftom of England, But this law did not puran end to the trade in flates.
