F R A N C E. NATIONAL CONVENTION, JULY 20.

A letter was read from Bourbois and Turon, Representatives to the Republica army in Vendee, dated July 15, seven miles from Bourbois.

Our army, which came from Angers, is now encamped at Ambigne, three leagues from Vieux, a town occupied by the enemy. Our object was to attack Vieux, but the Rebels, to the amount of 15 or 20,000 men, divided into two columns, anticipated us by attacking our advanced guard; and by this unexpected movement, the battle soon became general.

The Paris battalion, with Santerre at their head, fought like true Republicans. Our General, Lebonnetre, Bernier, and Menou, and all our soldiers, behaved with wonderful courage.

We made a point of flinging in the dangers of our brave soldiers—Bourbois's life was attacked by one of the rebels, who wounded him in the head; but the villain paid dearly for his rashness, as it cost him his life.

The Palais Royal was on the 25th inst. blocked up by 3000 infantry and 200 horse, under pretence of seizing the black jobbers, but in effect to apprehend those who are enemies of the present demagogue.
