A' difease more terrible and destruetive, has never appeared among mankind ; a Smith who had 19 journeymen in his shop, of these 17 took the difease, and ten of there died-one other who had 13, ail took the difeafe and died. A fhipwright, at Kenfington, buried 16 perfons out of his own family. These instances are enough to give fome idea of what has really been our diffrefs, and it would be adding even horror to discription, to reprefent the flate of fmall neighbornoods of poor people, crouded to gether in narrowallies, where houses were filled with inmates; in forme rafes it feems as if the whole were fwept away, except the children and those of very old age. Surely fuch a difease ought to be stayed from entering a city, by ever possible means.
