

A LETTER was read from commissioners DALBUT, with the army of the Alps, stating, that the Piedmontese army made a general movement on the 7th, to attack the French at Santona; and on the 9th, the Sardinian King went to Saorgio to harangue his troops—He displayed his eloquence in a pompous discourse, the subject was the miracle of the *Sainte Madone*, (Virgin Mary) who on the 6th of Sept. 1707, saved Turin, from the attack of the French; he did not forget to bring with him the relics of the bones of all the Saints who protect his kingdom; especially the Saint of St. George, which has preserved its whitewash, unpolished, for so many centuries—the half club of St. Lazarus, which was sent to him from Heaven, through the milky way. In fine, the deluded Piedmontese, who had, perhaps, some miscreants among them, thinking to run to certain victory, met the French bayonets which proved to them, that the Madona, cited of supporting the cause of tyrants, had taken the part of the Republicans. They left two dead and wounded on the spot, and as many were taken prisoners, who heartily envied the authors of so unfortunate a defeat.

*Letter from Cittad. ANDRE DUMONT, Commissioner of the department of the Somme, dated Amiens, Sept. 20.*

Citizen President,

"I WRITE you often; but if I wrote an hundred times a day, I should always answer to you for no specific information."

Having spread my net into the Boisnois, I have caught a member of the English Parliament—the brother-in-law of the Duke of Cumberland—Page of the Queen—some Knights of St. Louis—a Marshal of Camp—a number of English gentlemen—some Priffs, &c. all in my bag. Do me the favour immediately, to instruct for about six dozen of these pretty birds, which I shall send you under a good escort. The enclosed bullet will acquaint the President of a considerable deposit of gold and silver. I am going to furnish another expedition, which I have entrusted to an intimate friend of mine, who I am sure will be as successful as I have been."

Gen. LANDREMONTE, informs the Convention, that he has taken and delivered the Fort Kell. The intrigues of La Vendee have been driven from Chateauguérard, and are flying every where before the patriotic army; there all resources is flight, and that also they will soon be deprived of.

*NEW YORK, Dec. 20.  
Copy of a letter from Col. HAMPBREYS, Minister, resident at the Court of Portugal, to the Secretary of State of the United States, dated Gibraltar, October 6, 1793.*

SIR,  
A dispatch boat has just arrived from Algiers, which brings authentic intelligence, that since for two months, is concluded between Portugal and that Regency. In consequence of which eight Algerine corsairs, viz. four frigates, one brig and three Xebecs has just passed through the Straights, into the Atlantic. Our vessels will now be exposed to the most imminent hazard of capture, as it was the Portuguese squadron alone which hitherto prevented the Algerines from cruising in the Atlantic against them. I have thought it of so much importance to put our countrymen immediately upon their guard, to justify me in diffusing express news to the news to our Consuls at Cadiz, Malaga and Lisbon. And I hope not a single instant is communicating it to you, in order that such acts shall be made of, as may be deemed expedient in the United States.
