Anecdote of ANKERSTROM,

ANKERSTROM was principally implicated in the murder of the King by the spirit of revenge which he had long harboured in his breast. He had formerly been accused of a crime against the state, and by the monarch's particular command, was sent hundred three hundred miles to take his trial, altho a captain in the guards, and altho all nobles on like occasions had ever been treated with the regard due to their rank. The tribunal absolved him of all guilt; but his acquittal could not walk away the remembrance of this indignity. It has been observed, that even of the coolest temper ever gave rise to the great pertinacity of vengeance. Ankerstrom evinced both. When after a long lapse of time he had resolved to kill the King and was waiting for him at the marketplace, he sat down in the great calmness to drink a glass of lemonade. The King came in; Ankerstrom rose, mixed with the crowd, fired one pistol, threw away the other, and returned with unexampled ease and coolness to finish his beverage.

When called before the Lieutenant of the police, the second pistol was unloaded, and he was asked if the other had contained a similar charge. He counted the nails, rather than the balls, that made part of the charge, and said they were ten in number. No falsehood, the other was better loaded, in that there were twelve.

On the day of execution, the white and red, for which his complexion was remarkable, remained unaltered, and his demeanor bespoke the most perfect unconcern. Observing the four posts to which his quarters were to be nailed, at the foot corners of the scaffold: "This is then my grave," said

he: "I rejoice to see it."—He then turned to the minister of religion who attended him: "Sir," said he, "I thank you for your attention, and hope to meet you in a better world; for I am convinced I have rendered a great service to my country." In the like calm manner he submitted to the fatal stroke.—He had been three times whipped before.
