And be it further Refolmed, That the inshed be it forther Replaced, That the in-bed he is any of the towns or diffrible afterfaid, who that neglet to take and lodge in the Secretary's office, the plante-quired as aforefaid, within the time shown limited therefore, hall forfiet and pay to the sleef the Commonwealth, the fam of forty proads; which from fail be added to foch delinquent town's or diffill's propor-tion of the State iax, which may be granttion of the State tax, which may be grant-ed next after the first day of June, 1755,
