every deferpition of the Cherokes, who every defeription of the Cherokees who were prefent, and the death whoop was again repeated—The Middle Striker a dif-tinguished chief from Will's Town, met the prisoner near the Maw's bot, and raif-

my enemy!"

The Hanging Maw who is highly exafperated on account of the many injuries he had received which he attributes entirely to the deptedations committed by the Creeks and lower Cherokers on the frentiers, expressed a define to fealp the prisoner alive, before he should be sent to you, but was diffuseded, and took only the war-lock, with which they denced the feelp dence all night, and nied all the certmony of exultation commonly practifed among lu-dians on the death or capture of an ene-

Much credit is due to King and Cunniogham (who, with this, will deliver you the priloser) for their spirited exertions in encouraging and going with the Cherokees, to overtake and bring to punishment the guilty, and thereby spare the innocent from going, and torton; pare me innocentrion in he anger of the exalperated from irr inhabitants, who, with difficulty, reflained themselves from crassing the Tennestee and taking, what they term fatisfaction on the first Indian they should discover.

The Indians, particularly those of the Maw's camp, deserve great attention for their readiness to turn our, and their ac-tivity in pursuing and taking the mander-er. I have already given to Willies, who fill ferzed the Creek fellow, a new rifle

It was truly pleasing to fee the change of fentiment, and the farisfaction that pre-vailed among the militis, noder the com-mand of Col. Kelly, upon the delivery of mand of Col. Activ, upon the delivery of the moderer, from being highly exafterat-ed at the Cherokees, believing them to be the morderers of 1th. Several of thera passed the river to the Maw's camp, and ioined in the war dance ; and thi ing, upon the Cherokees croffing to the

hearty welcome.

This proof of the friendthip and activity of the Cherokees gives absordant reason to believe, that they might in future be employed against marsading parties of Creeks if accompanied in like manner by some active frontier citizens. You must have anticipated, that the Creeks if a

Cherokees have their apprehentions, that the part they have taken in apprehending this morderer, will draw the Creeks upon them, and have requested me to all you. in case it does, what support they may ex-

ped from the United States.
