SIR, TriE difagreeable crisis at which matten have lately arrived in some of the west-ern counties of Pennsylvania, with regard to the laws laying duties on spirits distilled within the United States, and on stills, feems to render proper a review of the cirdiat feene, from their commencement to the prefent time, and of the conduct which has hitherto been observed on the part of the government, its motives and emel-in order to a better judgment of the measures necessary to be pursued in the existing

emergency.
The opposition to those lars in the four most western counties of Penniylvania, (Alleghany, Washington, Fayette, and Westmoreland) commenced as early as they were known to have been palled. It has continued, with different degrees of vio continued, with different degree of vio-lence, in the different counties, and at dif-ferent periods. But Walhington has uni-formly dillinguilled its refitance, by a more excelline (pirit, than has appeared in the other counties, and items to have been chiefly inftrumental in hindling and keep

ing alive the flime.
The opposition at first manifested itself
in the milder shape of the circulation of opinions unfrequentle to the law, and cal culsted, by the inflaence of public dife rean, to floorage the accepting of holding of effices under it, or the complying with it by those who might be so disposed; to which was added the flow of a discontinuate of the teathers of offilling.

Another meeting accordingly took place Adoliter meeting accordingly took place on the 7th of September, 1791, at Pinf-burgh in the county of Alleghauy, at which there appeared perfors in character of del-gates from the four wellern counties.

This meeting entered into refolution in their obieft and not lefs inflamatory in their tendency, that those which had before passed the meeting at Washington. Their refositions con-tained severe censures not only on the law which was the immediate subject of objection, but upon what they termed the fomble interest of the public debt; the holders and transferrers, and the infittohousers and transferrers, and the funda-tion of a national back. The fame un-friendly temper towards the government of the United States, which feemed to have led out of their way the meeting at Washington, appears to have produced fimilar wandering in that at Pittsburgh.

A reprefectation to Congress and a re nonfirance to the legislature of Penniyi vania against the law more particularly complained of were prepared by this meet ing—published together with their othe proceedings in the Pittsburgh Gazette and afterwards prefeated to the refpedity bodies to whom they were addressed.

These meetings composed of very in out moderation or prudence, are juilly chargeable with the excelles which have been from time to time committed : fervin to give confidency to an oppy firion which has at length manured to a point, that threat ens the foundations of the government and of the union—unlefs speedily and effectual v fobdord.
