The method of Seguin's has a triple advantage; fift it and expedicions mode of tanning : econdly, lefs expence ; and laftly, m complete; than any other method, as it gives the highest degree of folidity to lea-ther, which the tan can communicate; and on comparison, hides thus trained have been found to exceed the drelled fkins of

any other country whatforver.

The quickness of this method is foch, that by taking the proper precantions, calf fries may be tanned in two days, and the ox hide in ten or fifteen days. rendering, in the orceefs the ufe of barley wholly unnecellary, of which all tanneries have hitherto confumed a very great quan-

tity.

A large capital is also unnecessary; and remote to refer may be turned to advantage; by backing and reparating from the back that matter which is the principle of tan, upon the very fpot; thus reducing the ne-cellary part of the bark to a very small weight, and confequently much diminish ed the expense of carriage. The fimpli-city of the whole operation is fach that any private man may tan hides for his own confumption, with more facility, than a common professed tanner.

The gaity, the good humour, the vivacity, and the vapity of the French, never abandon them: and, with 5 much reason to be vaid, as those at present here have, it would indeed be furprizing if they had taken this for the moment of reformation, in that respect.
"This vanity, which scarcely any

them has the art to conceal, is the only circumfiance that can, in the finallest de-gree, balance the laudable part of their conduct. The discipline of the troops in accurate and unexceptionable.
