HOLLAND,

To re-establish public credit, and the cause of Bank of Amsterdam, negotiates a loan of 7 millions of francs, at 4 per cent., to be secured by the revenues of the city, but few are found to approve the proposal. Zealand has at length sent Deputies to the National Assembly, which has nominated a Committee to frame a new Constitution.

DUSSELDORF,

Is the scene of continual preparation for opening the campaign, which both parties protest, not to mention its commencement, but confusion and disarray in their cause would be the consequence of misfortune. The French are staled between their armies of the Somme and Meuse, the Rhine, and Moselle to muster half a million of men. The statement is doubtless exaggerated; but their force is immense, and that must be nearly, if not quite, equalled by the Imperials, as admitted by accounts, and confirmed by circumstances. Dreadful mud is the result, when bodies of such strength and courage come to conflict.

SPAIN,

We apprehend fresh continental attachment to her new Allies, who have delayed, or presented her, the means of defeating, or disarming. She is stated to have at full of the line at Cartagena, and the armada at Cadiz nearly ready for sea, and to have again distributed several ships of war with troops to the West Indies.

SARDINIA

Has broken off the treaty, probably entered into with France for the purpose of gaining time for preparation, which is general and active. The Austria troops have been considerably increased in Italy, where the brave Venetians Basilius has been appointed to the chief command.

NAPLES,

Principally governed by the Councils of Andria is about to redouble its exertions in support of the confederacy.

RUSSIA,

Oriental in the requirement of power, has lately exacted that part of Lithuania which is fourth of Grandmo, to the Empire.

PRUSSIA,

Which has given in exchange the considerable maritime towns of Memel and the extensive county north of Nemore.

SWEDEN,

Unceasingly seeks to obtain that force which the fees essential to her independence; her wisdom, whilst it is possible, will preserve her peace.

DENMARK,

Has received the Ambassador of France, which the states is a proof of her neutrality.—Fear of the consequence of breaking it, we desire, is cut short for its continuance.

RETRROSPECT OF POLITICS.

FRANCE. The fall of the gallant Charette, is expected to follow, if not to terminate, the war in L'Yen die; but opposition to the Confidere Antennas appears in other quarters to grow.

The Executive Directory say, "our fate, O France! is then entirely in your hands; the law relative to General Mandarre he faithfully observed, and France will come out from the revolution happy and triumphant; if the law does not, a profound thrill will be immediately under all our feet." The public prints in Paris are unanimous in the existence of the evasions, and the increase of depreciation.
