

imposing our laws, by the British government, he knew of none, and had never heard of one instance of the British government either avowing the right, or profiting upon it, of imprisonment of an American in their service; but many instances have occurred of complaints to the government, and all were immediately referred to; and although it was become very difficult to extricate the British government, he was impelled, from his own sense of duty and consistency, on the subject to say, that no such instance had ever taken place or would ever, of the British government, justify the imprisonment of natives of the United States or one who was an acknowledged citizen. It is not unfair, said Mr. Tracy, to attribute to the government unnumbered millions of dollars of individuals, far removed from the seat and control of the government? It was equally unanswerable to say, that we were not protected by the treaty and should not be, when the British government had proposed to pay all former depredations made in that way upon our commerce, we may not be responsible to suppose, they would prevent, or pay for any such depredation now made; and they certainly would prevent all such, which were not from the conduct of war rendered inevitable.

An objection had been raised against the treaty, that we should be in consequence of it suffer British influence over our politics and government. If I thought that to be a fact, said Mr. Tracy, I should be unhappy at the carriage, for I wish to avoid the charge of *any foreign politics*; but as he said, he could not see any such danger, if we would be just to ourselves, we might defy any and all operation of the politics of foreigners. Mr. Tracy said, he had but touched upon a few of the many important points which presented themselves in considering this momentous question, of which would afford abundant matter for such a number of observations, as would occupy a length of time, equal to that, which the committee would allow to any one man. He concluded by saying, he thought the happiness of the United States, in the stability if not the existence of the government, depended on passing the resolution and he could not for a moment indulge belief, that it would be negatived.
