(CIRCUULAR)

TO THE COLLECTORS OF THE CUSTOMS.

SIR,

The enclosed act for the relief and protection of American slaves, passed at the last session of Congress, and is not determined who proposed it, requires that he in any case deemed sufficient, may have such proof shall be authenticated to witness a delivery of the certificate of citizenship, in that case presented; the President of the United States has thought it expedient to

add to the same, as follows:

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
