

wife of the casanova. These circumstances were very favorable for the enemy. A body of 10 or 12,000 men, who I could easily defeat, gained their rest, would have entirely defeated them.

The troops though inferior to the enemy, have done prodigies of valor. The troops most distinguished are the fifth regiment of Carabiniers and the 8th Chasseurs, the 12th hull brigade of light infantry, and the line the 6th.

"The light artillery was conducted with the greatest bravery. The greatest pride is due to the company of citizens Moltz, etc., etc.

"Provosts are no longer slaves. We have taken here near 40,000 pieces of grain, hay, straw, and the stores of the enemy, which they were not able to destroy."

From the LONDON GAZETTE Sept. 23. Dispatches, of which the following are copies, have been received from Capt. Anstruther, by the right Hon. Lord Grenville, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Head-quarters of His Royal Highness, the Duke Charles, Windsor, Sept. 10.

My Lord,

I have the satisfaction of informing your Lordship, that the progress of the Austrian arms continues to be marked by brilliant and uninterrupted success.

His Royal Highness the Duke Charles, having quitted his camp near Wetzlar on the 5th, passed on in advanced guard, under the command of Leopold Krey, to seize the De Bouché, and the Spessart. That officer, arriving in the neighbourhood of Alsfeldsburg in the afternoon of the 6th, found the enemy, to the number of two thousand men, posted so as to dispute the pass from the forest. After a severe cannonade, which lasted a considerable time, he attacked them with much spirit, drove them from their advantageous position, and his cavalry, still pursuing them without halting thro' the towns, dispersed them in the woods on the other side of the Mayen.

The loss of the enemy on this occasion amounts to above a thousand men, of whom six hundred are prisoners.

The Duke advanced on the 7th to Alsfeldburg, where the main body halted on the 8th; but intelligence being received that the enemy had advanced on the preceding night, the advanced guards were posted on successively to Kletten and the Nidda.

On the 9th, His Royal Highness marched to Darmstadt, and on the 10th to Windesheim; the advanced corps occupying the important point of Friedberg.

Ten thousand men, drawn from the garrison of Mainz, have advanced towards Koenigstein, which was abandoned by the enemy on the 8th, and will be a very efficient reinforcement of infantry to the army.

The conflagration of rural roads and defilements have exceeded the expectations of the most sanguine, and have greatly frustrated the designs and aims of the enemy.

Two days after the action of the 5th, had directed his retreat to Fulda, was still in hopes of gaining before the Duke, the strong position of Berga, where, reinforced by the two divisions which had been left behind in the neighbourhood of Frankfurt, he might have checked for a time the progress of the Austrians. In this view he arrived by forced marches at Schleitheim, in the evening of the 6th, but finding that the Duke was already master of Alsfeldsburg, he gave up his attempt, and turning to the right, directed his march across the Vogelsberg towards Wetzlar, where, it is reported, he is endeavoring to assemble his army.

From information of the most authentic nature, relative to the present situation of the French troops, I can venture to assure your Lordship, that they are in a state of the utmost confusion and despair. A great part of the infantry have thrown away their arms, and are almost naked. Their retreat has lost all semblance of order, and has become a tumultuous flight. Executive fatigues have probably destroyed more than the sword; and the continual dread they entertain of a general rising of the peasants in the country they traverse has spread a panic among them, which renders them deaf to the commands of their officers. The loss which Jordan sustained since he advanced from the Lines, is to be eliminated, without exaggeration, at twenty thousand men, a number which can easily exceed by deficiency, in the present state of his army.

The conduct of the French, during their abode in this country, has exhibited a series of depravities which is degrading to human nature. Robbery and peculation have been universal in every rank, and in every department of the army.

Every species of violence has been exercised on the properties of individuals. Many villages have been reduced to ashes, without the existence of even a pretext for this act of barbarity; and the countries, thru' which their army passed, exhibit every where a spectacle of the most desolating and direful.

My Lord,

His report received from General La Tour is ignorant, that on the 18th and 19th, Moran attempted, with his right wing, to make himself master of the bridge in the Yser at Munich. After a very obstinate combat, which lasted the whole of both days, he was repulsed with considerable loss.

General La Tour, in the mean time, having formed a junction with the corps of General Naudeau, attacked on the 20th, the left wing of the enemy, and drove him before him the space of six leagues. In the neighbourhood of Liegnitz, however, the enemy, having received considerable reinforcements, pushed himself so advantageously, that General La Tour, after several vain efforts to dislodge him, judged it expedient to retire to his original post behind the Yser; having however succeeded in the object of his operation, which was to weaken the enemy's attack on the Prince of Bellenberg.

There is yet no positive information that Ma-

rean has begun his retreat, altho' the last movements there is reason to suppose that he is making preparations for it.

From the CENTINEL, SITUATION OF THE WORLD.
N. H. GREAT BRITAIN.

After the French Republic, the next nation which affects the attention of the world is Prussia. The patis has taken on the greatest European politics is confirmation, and in immense maritime force, scattered over the globe, makes her formidable to every commercial nation. We shall take a fair view of her SITUATION AS IT AFFECTS HER EXTERIOR. In the war against France and Holland, Britain may be said to have received all the whole coalition he required. In the South, she has gained Corfou, a large island in the Mediterranean, 8 miles long, and 40 broad—and Porto Ferrajo, in the island of Elba, is the territories of the Grand Duke of Tuscany—the latter having lately forced his independence of the capital of Italy, by the French and the Sicilian Tricolore from the French and all the other islands of the Dutch have fallen into the hands, with produce to the amount of nearly four millions sterling. The Cape of Good Hope is also theirs. In the West Indies they have effected themselves of Martinique, Grenada, and St. Lucia, with part of St. Domingo. To balance this, they have suffered much loss in their commerce from the English cruisers; and their losses at the expense of many thousand lives of their best sailors and seamen. If recent accounts are to be relied on, the British colonies of Newfoundland, and St. John are in danger of falling into the hands of the French. Justice is anticipated that all the world conspired against them.
