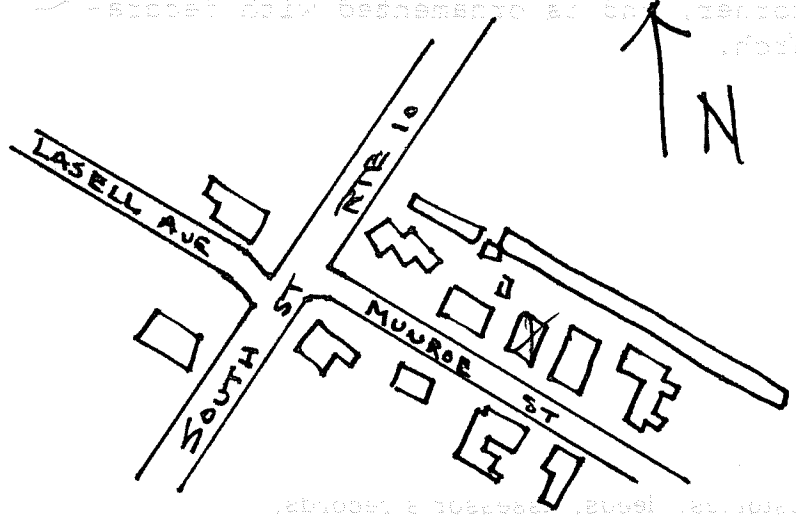

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

In May 1893, John Keating sold a parcel of land to Thomas Kiley, upon which a house was built in the following year. Mr. Kiley was a stone mason, and was listed as living here in the 1894-95 local directory.

This Queen Anne styled house has a slate pyramidal roof, with front and side gables, capping a two story complex mass. A swept dormer breaks the roof above the main entrance on the facade, while a wrap-around porch covers the entrance on the first floor. The porch is composed of turned posts, a frieze of turned spindles, and a balustrade of turned balusters; and has a projection with pedimented gable at the entrance. The front gable caps a 2-story bay at the NW corner, and is ornamented with decoratively-cut shingles and a recessed arch.
