C. H. Jones, local architect. 1875, Gazette notes that "C. H. Jones of thes town, the well-known painter, is acquiring quite a reputation as an architect. A schoolhouse and hotel were at that time attributed to him; by 1887, the year of the design of the Strong (Locke) house, Jones had planned 57 houses, 3 churches, and other buildings. "His first house was the house of Wm. A. Dickinson, Hatfield." Other residences in Northampton designed by Jones include the Crooks House (28 Pomeroy Terrace),

Mrs. George (Martha) Strong sold the residence to Mary A. Locke in 1895 and the Locke name appears along with the house on the 1895 Atlas of Northampton. It is probably for this reason that the house is locally known as the Locke House. Three stories in height, the residence is irregularly massed and incorporates numerous gables, an octagonal tower, and a turretted second story porch. Wood siding is delicately scaled and scallopped; porch railings and slim balusters contribute to the lightness of the composition. Decorative glass beading appears in panels on the corner tower. Interiors are modestly executed.
