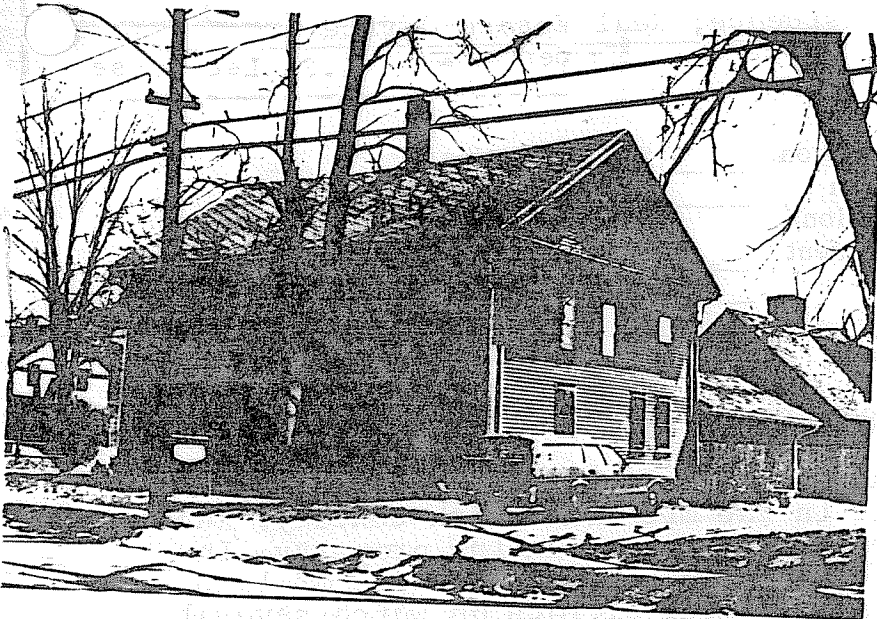


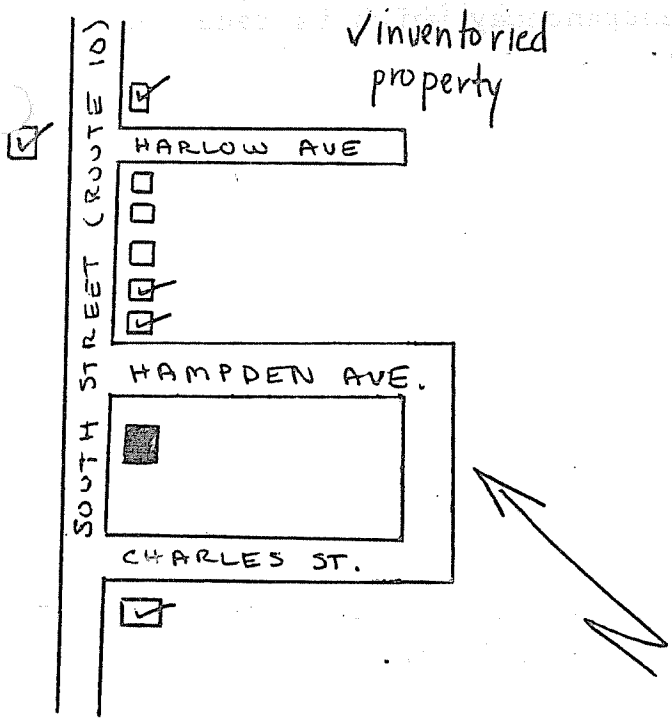

9. Historical Significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

The Day Family owned the land on which this large Greek Revival style house was built in the mid-nineteenth century. The Days owned a brickyard and much of the surrounding property. In 1899 the Day Brothers declared bankruptcy and the tract of land was subdivided, creating a large number of lots on which several bungalows and other dwellings were built.

The Greek Revival homestead is a large, cubic mass five bays wide and three deep. The gable ends are enclosed and a deep heavy cornice encircles the eaves. Pilasters appear at the corners of the facade and flank the entranceway which is recessed and emphasised by rows of sidelights.
