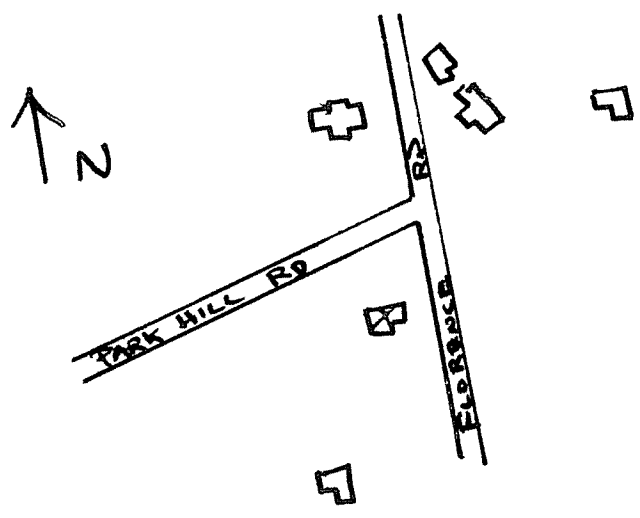

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This bungalow is 1½ stories in height with ridge roof and shed dormer with four windows on the front slope. A one-story porch extends across the facade and is covered by a continuation of the front slope of the roof, at a less steep pitch. The porch posts are constructed of loose, uncoursed stone, as is the foundation of the house and the chimney on the southern side. The main part of the house is built of cement blocks with simulated "quarry" finish. These same blocks with stone work patterns are used for a low wall on the front of the porch. On the southern side of the house is an oriel window with shed roof and projecting rafters.
