



The first Catholic mass in Northampton was said in a private house in Leeds in 1834. In 1866, St. Mary's, Northampton, was established as an independent parish serving the Catholic population from Easthampton to Hoosac Mountain. Annunciation parish, composed of the villages of Florence and Leeds in Northampton, and of Haydenville in Williamsburg, was set off from St. Mary's in 1878 (Haydenville and Leeds were made a separate parish eleven years later).
