In 1865 Samuel and Lucinda Hemenway bought a little more than two acres of land from Thomas Pomeroy for \$287. Mr. Hemenway was a grocer and established his homestead here during the late 1860's. The house is Colonial in appearance, with its symmetrical five-bay facade and central entrance, however, unless the house was moved from another location it wasn't built until the 1860's. No house is shown on the 1860 map.
