9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

"This was the most important and commodious business block in Florence, and it accordingly was at once appropriated by the leading local growing lines of trade." It was built by Charles Parsons, who bought the land from his father, Horace K. Parsons. Horace Parsons was a prominent Florence businessman, and Charles took over his father's concerns, which included selling hay, grain and coal, as well as clothing and gentlemen's furnishings. He also performed many legal services for the village including be drafting of wills, settling of real estate, and acting as a notary public; and was the head of the Florence Fire Department.

When originally built, the Parsons Block contained the Florence Post Office at the corner, four retail firms on the first floor; three retail firms, a pool room and bowling alley in the basement; and a public hall, set for lodge rooms of the different fraternal orders, and five "up-to-date" flats on the second floor.
