

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The house is an interesting combination of plain stucco surfaces, complex form, heavy timbering as expressed in end rafters and brackets, and several different window shapes, used singly or in bands. Basically of T-shape with the foot towards the street, eac end has a gambrel form with shed dormers above the first story, which is rectilinear. The entrance located at the northern end of the facade, is covered by a gabled hood with large brackets.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built in 1914 for Matthew O'Connor at a cost of \$4000. The 1915 directory lists Mr. O'Connor as a general contractor, carpenter and mason, and he most likely constructed the house himself.
