9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

This large brick building was built as the nurses' home and training school for Cooley Dickinson Hospital. This is the only hospital in Northampton, and was opened in 1886 through a \$70,000 legacy of Caleb Cooley Dickinson, a citizen of Hatfield. In 1901 a training school for nusses was opened, but the hospital quickly outgrew its samll quarters. Alexander Mc Callum, a prominent local merchant and industrialist left a large sum of money to the hospital upon his decease, and this building was dedicated in memory of him in 1920. The original Victorian hospital has almost disappeared behind 20th century additions and remodelings, but this building remains substantially as it was built.
