Warner St. was laid out in two sections: the first, in 1858, being from Paper Mill Road (now Federal St.) to Hinckley St., and the second, during the mid 1860's, from Hinckley St. westerly to Maple St. (now Liberty St.). The second section climbed the southeastern slopes of Baker's Hill and provided sweeping vistas of the Connecticut River Valley south to the Mount Tom Range.

This house was built sometime before 1873 when it forst shows on the local atlas. The first known owner, Charles H. Miller, a cutler at the Northampton Cutlery Co., lived here during the 1880's.

Two stories in height, and L-shaped, the house has little in the way of ornamentation except for slightly projecting window surrounds and a half porch with square posts.
