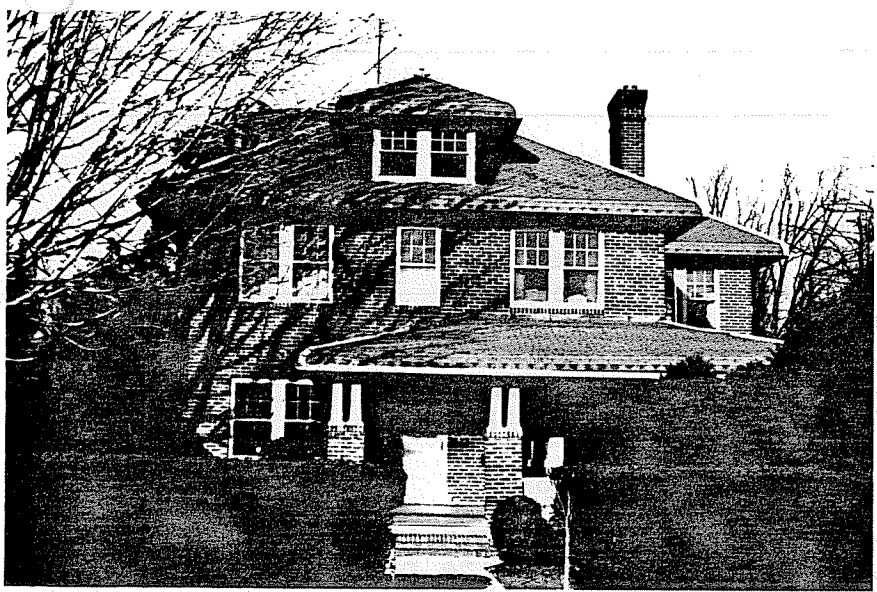

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

This large brick house was built during the mid 1920's on the corner of Adare Pl., which was laid out during the same period through the Maloney estate on Prospect St. The first known owner and occupant of this house was James Hurley, the president of the Brookside Dairy, which was located on Hawley St. in Northampton. Mr. Hurley is listed here in the 1930 directory.

This house is two stories in height with hipped roof and turned-down eaves. The three-bay facade has a central entrance flanked by a double window on either side. The entrance and eastern window are covered by a one-story porch with hipped roof and turned-down eaves.
