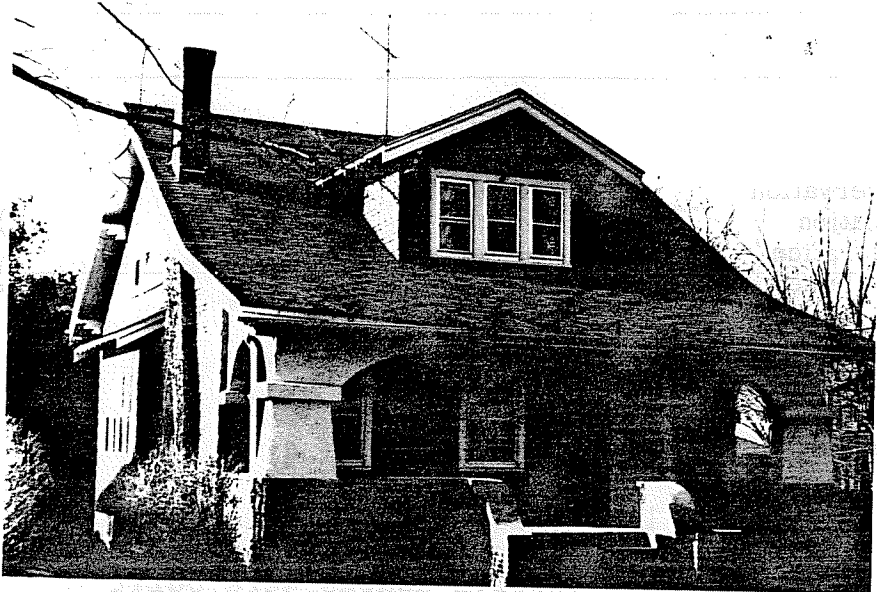

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

Adare Place was laid out during the 1920's as a short residential street between Prospect St. and the Williamsburg branch of the New York New Haven and Hartford RR. Ten of the present twelve houses were built by 1930 including this one. The first known owner and occupant was Wayne Manning, an assistant professor of Botany at Smith College.

The house is 1 and 1/2 stories in height with ridge roof and large gabled dormer. The wide eaves are supported by large brackets. The front slop of the roof changes pitch at the front wall and extends out to enclose a front porch which has large stucco piers at front corners, and a large arch spanned between them.
