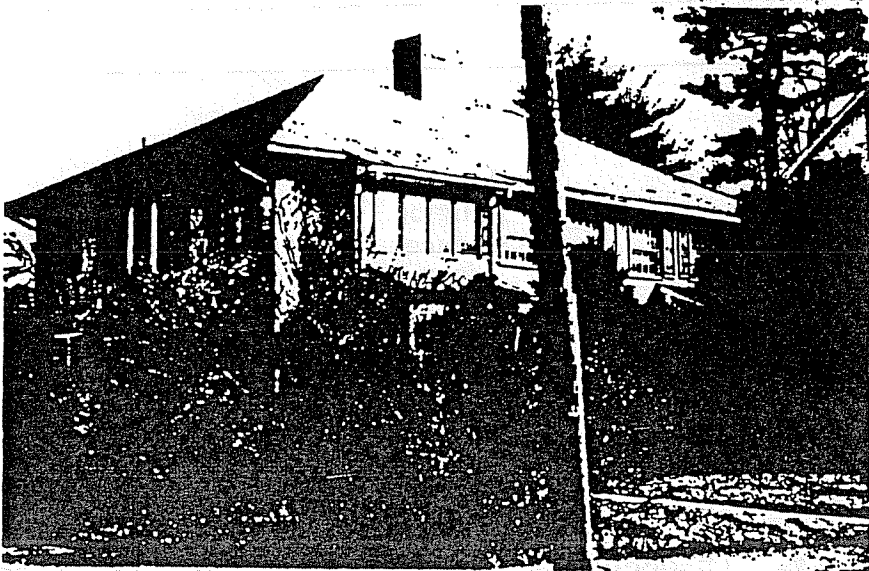

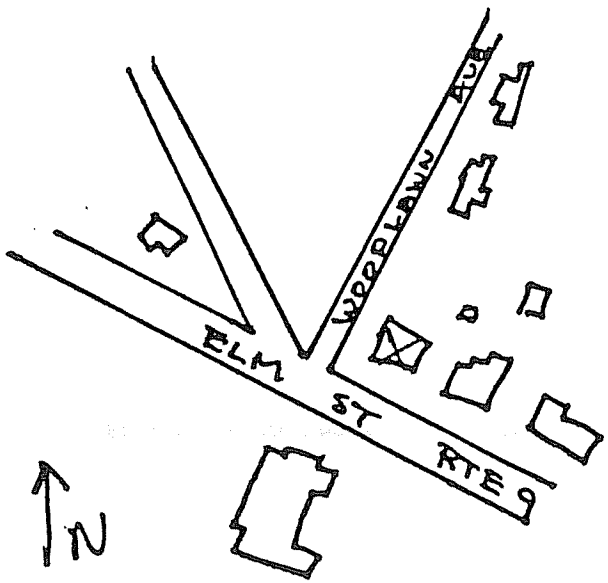

This large stucco house was built around 1920, most likely for Hugh Mc Connell, vice-president of Easthampton Mfg. Co., who is listed here in the 1922 directory. It occupies a prominent corner location on Woodlawn Ave., which had been laid out in the early 20th century through a portion of the Warson estate. This estate was later donated to the city and became Childs Park.
