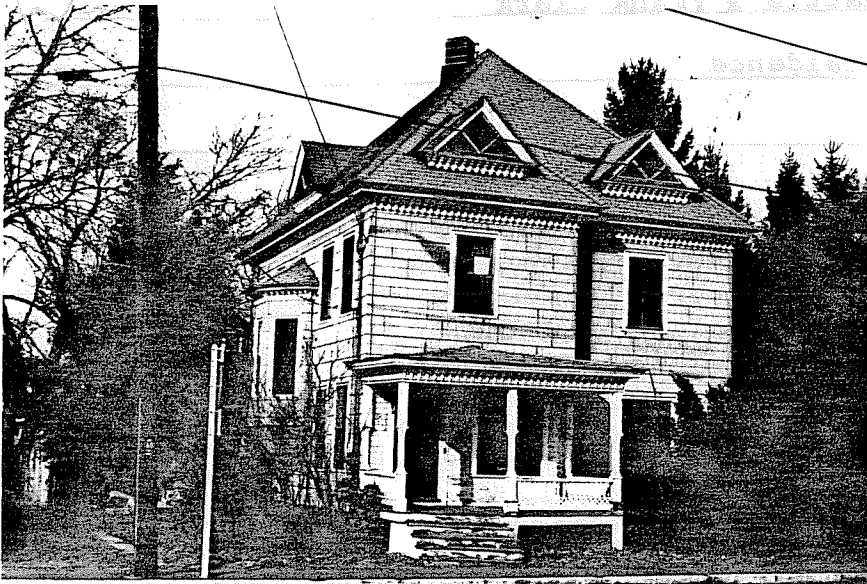

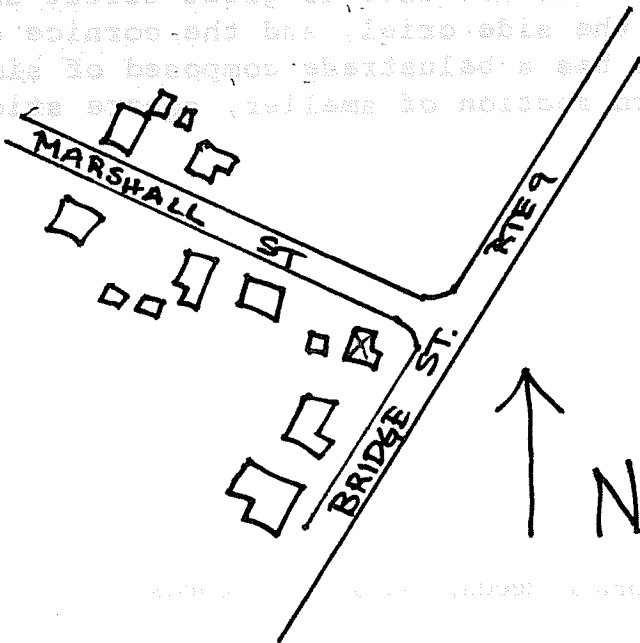

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

This large, 2½ story house was built in the early 20th century on one of J.W. Hubbard's subdivision lots. Hubbard had opened up his homestead to residential development in 1891, and this was one of the few lots available that was directly on Bridge St. Most of the other lots were located on the newly created Hubbard Ave., and Marshall, Swan and Crosby Sts.

A pyramidal roof pierced by triangular dormers caps the two-story cubic mass. Small, closely spaced brackets are used to great effect under the dormers, the cornice, the roof of the side oriel, and the cornice of the front porch. The front porch also has a balustrade composed of simple square balusters atop a diamond-pattern section of smaller, square sticks.
