

9. Historical Significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

An early dwelling in Northampton, now located on Damon Road, this structure faces south toward Bridge Street and is located near the Coolidge Bridge which spans the Connecticut River. The dwelling is 1½ stories in height, with ridge roof and a single central entrance spanned by a transom. A pair of chimneys are present in the steeply pitched roof.

Bridge Street originally led from the town center to a ferry crossing of the Connecticut River; in the 19th century the first bridges were built and the highway was named. To the north off Damon Road the terminus of the Northampton-New Haven Canal was constructed in the early 19th century; this section of Northampton was thus important for transportation and communication with other valley communities.
