A subdivision plan for Orchard St. was filed in 1897. At that time there were three homesteads on the north side of Bridge St. between the cemetery and Grant Ave. These homesteads extended noetherly almost to North St. Orchard St. and Elizabeth St. (1908) were laid out through these homesteads. Both streets were predominantly developed with tw-family houses.

This double house is split vertically, giving each unit two and a half floors. The house is two stdraes in height with a high hip roof. Projecting wall gables are at either end of the facade and cap two-story, three-sided bays. There is also a central, pedimented dormer. A one-story porch with gabled entrance extends across the facade. The porch has tapering posts on pedestals and a balustrade.
