In 1867 the Bay State Hardware Co. filed a subdivision plan for Main St. (now Riverside Dr.), High St. (now Lexington Ave.) and Maple St. (now Liberty St.). The plan was for residential lots, and would enable the cutlery workers to live nearby and have their own lot of land. In many cases, the houses were originally owned by the company and sold to the workers after a number of years.

William Frawley, a grinder at the Bay State Hardware Co., bought lots #26 and #28 "with buildings" for \$800 in 1867. This might mean the present house, but the price seems rather low. Mr. Frawley is shown as the owner of this house on the 1873 Atlas.

The house is two stories in height, with gable end to the street and the entrance on the southern side. A one and a half story ell extends to the rear and a full-length porch covers the southern side.
