ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The house is 2½ stories in height with pedimented end to the street and a 2½ story gabled projection on the southern side. Both gables have an oculus located within. A one-story porch with flat roof, projecting cornice and friese, paneled posts with small brackets, and a balustrade covers the three-bay facade and extends along the southern side to the projection. The first floor of the facade has the entrance and two French windows. The rest of the windows in the house are rectangular with two-over-two sashes and heavy cornices.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

In 1856, Aaron Breck, a farmer, sold his son Aaron Breck, Jr. his homestead on Elm Street and 2½ acres in the "Lower Walnut Tree division" of the meadows for \$1.00. Mr. Breck, Sr.'s homestead was no. 206 Elm Street and Aaron Jr. probably constructed this house for his own residence. The 1860 directory lists Aaron Sr. on King Street, so the old homestead was probably leased out. About 1890, Charles Crouch, Northampton's most prolific developer of the 19th century, bought the farm with both house: standing and opened Knnsington Avenue between them.
