In 1872 Payson Pomeroy, a mason and builder, bought lot no. 10 of Minor and Searle's 1870 subdivision plan for Wahington Ave. He soon built this house for his own residence, as it is shown on the 1873 atlas. Mr. Pomeroy sold his house to John L. Warner sometime before 1884. Mr. Warner was employed as a bookeens:

house for his own residence, as it is shown on the 10/3 atlas. Mr. Pomeroy sold his house to John L. Warner sometime before 1884. Mr. Warner was employed as a bookeeper for Luther Warner's silk manufactory but soon became Northampton's tax collector clerk for the sewer commissioners, positions that he was still holding in 1930.

The house is two stories in height with slate hipped roof and twostory bay window on the western side. Cut brownstone is used for the sills and lintels of the two over two sash windows, and a one-story porch with hipped roof and chamfered posts covers the three-bay facade, which consists of two French windows and an entrance.
