This large, Tudor style house stands out on Wahington Ave., which is mostly built up with Italianate and Colonail Revival houses of the late 19th century. The street had been opened in 1870 and by 1873 fifteen houses had been constructed.

The house was designed by Waldo Crook for his own residence. It derives inspiration from the vermucular houses of the 16th and: early 17th century England. Fr. Crook continued to practice in Morthampton until his retirement in the early 1970's.

The house is 2 stories in height with ridge roof, a 2 and ½ story gabled projection on the western side, and a centered wall gable on the facade. The facade has an asymmetrical placement of two types of windows: rectangular sash windows and smaller square ones. Walf-timbering divides the house into horizontal and vertical sections and enhances the picturesque quality of the form.
