

This is one of the earlier houses on the street, appearing on the 2095 atlas as the property of Frank Mantor. Frank and James Mantor were rst listed here in the 1894 directory. James was superintendent of the C.L. Maynard Co., manufactures of shovels and hoes on Green St., while Frank was a clerk for the same company.

The house is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories tall, and L-shaped with a two-story tower with flaring hipped roof and gabled dormer in the crook of the L. Thes tower has the main entrance of the house and the first floor is covered by a porch with shed roof, spindle frieze, turned posts and halustrade. two-story bay windwo surmounted by an open porch with slate hipped roof, turned posts and balustrede projects from the front leg of the house.
