9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

In 1890 Kensington Ave. was opened through the Elm St. homestead of Aaron Breck. The street was developed by Charles Crouch, Northamptons most prolific builder of the 19th century. Mr. Crouch built houses on contract or built houses for himself the he then leased out as tenements. This house appears on the 1895 atlas and was the property of Frederick Crouch, probably Charles son and a carpenter. By 1900 the property was uned and occupied by George S Gere, a co-owner of the Gazette Printing Co.

The house is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories tall ans features a three-story bay window with polygonal roof on the facade and a two-story bay window on the western side. A two-story porch extends across the facade from the bay window and wraps halfway around the eastern side. This porch has a flat roof with bracketed cornices, spindle friezes, turned posts with brackets and balustrades.
