ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The house is $2\frac{1}{2}$ half stories tall with pedimented end to the street and a $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story gabled projection on the eastern side of the house. A one-story pedimented porch with balustrade, square posts and "stick" brackets cover the front entrance.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

Paradise Rd. was opened by J.C. Ward in 1867, but there was little development on the street until the latter part of the 1860 s. In 1867 there were four "cottages" constructed, including this house. The house was built for Mrs. Sarah A. Peck, the widow of A. Perry Peck, at a cost of \$2000. Mrs. Peck s family included two daughters, one of whom, Sarah P. Peck, taught at Smith College and puchased the property in 1869. In 1925 Smith College acquired the property, and has maintained its residential usage,
