

Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

In 1875 George Smith, a carpenter, bought a small lot of land fronting on North Main St. in Florence for \$250. Mr. Smith probably constructed this house himself and used it as his homestead. However his mortgage was foreclosed in and the property sold to Paul Granger, also a carpenter, in 1883.

The house is one-and-a-half stories in height with gable end to the street and a small oculus located high up in the front gable. A one-story bay window projects from the southern side of the house, while the three-bay facade is covered by a one-story porch with hipped roof, projecting cornice and chamfered posts.
