The house is 2 and 1/2 stories in height with gable end to the street and main entrance in the center of the five-bay western side. The front of the house is three bays wide and has a "Gothic" two over two sash window in the gable. The rest of the windows on the house are rectangular, with six over six sashes, except for two, small four-light windows above the main entrance. The door is crowned by a fanlight and an arched lattice covers the entrance. On the southern end of the house is a one-story sun porch with flat roof and balcony.
