Setting

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The smooth facade, openings with minimal surrounds and short tile roof set this early 20th century house apart from the predominantly "Colonially" inspired streetscape of Round Hill.

Marl Futnam was Morthampton's most prominent architect of the first half of the 20th century. The son of Roswell F. Putnam, a well-known architect of the turn of the century, Karl is mostly known for hi "Colonial" work. Mr. Putnam taught architecture at Smith College for over forty years.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built in 1929 for Joseph Fickett at a cost of \$20,000. Mr. Pickett was the president and treasurer of the Northampton Commercial College, an institution founded in the 1890's by his father. The College trained and furnished stenographers and office assistants, and served as an agency for the sales, rental and repair of typewn ers and adding machines.
